Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Instructional Materials (School Year 2015-16)

San Leandro Unified School District sets a high priority upon ensuring that sufficient and current textbooks and materials are available to support the school's instructional program. San Leandro Unified School District held a public hearing on September 20th, 2011 and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, and science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. The State of California. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home.

Textbooks are adopted by the Board of Trustees after review by teachers and parents according to the timeline established by the State of California. All district-adopted textbooks are State Board adopted and aligned to the Academic Content Standards established by the California Board of Education. The most recent textbooks as of January 2012 are illustrated in the chart.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

Age & Condition of Facilities

Jefferson Elementary School was originally constructed in 2004 and is currently comprised of 22 permanent classrooms, two portable classrooms for music and physical education, three Special Day Classrooms, a library, two staff work and break rooms, a multi-purpose room (MPR), a science/art room, and two playgrounds. Recent renovations include the addition of new bathroom fixtures throughout the school.

Cleaning Process

The principal works daily with two full-time custodial staff members to ensure that the cleaning of the school is maintained to provide for a clean and safe school.

Maintenance & Repair

District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and work orders are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and highest priority to emergency repairs. At the time of publication 100% of Jefferson Elementary's restrooms were in good working order. The chart displays the results of the most recent school facilities inspection provided by the district. While reviewing this report, please note that even minor discrepancies are reported in the inspection process. The items noted in the table have been scheduled for repair or are in the process of remediation. With the passage of Measure B, modernization and renovation of the San Leandro schools has begun. Deferred Maintenance Budget

The State School Deferred Maintenance Budget Program provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating/air conditioning, interior/exterior painting, electrical systems, and flooring. For the 2012-2013 school year, the district allocated \$164,000 for the deferred maintenance program. This represents .22% of the district's general fund budget.

A parent newsletter is sent home bi-weekly with information about school business and upcoming events. Each Friday the principal sends a telephone message to all parents informing them of upcoming events and ways to get involved with the school. The school website is updated once a week so parents can have the latest information about the school.

School Safety Plan

The safety of students and staff is a primary concern at Jefferson Elementary School. The school is in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. The School Site Safety plan is updated every fall by the principal and the School Site Committee. The key element of the School Site Safety Plan entails emergency evacuation procedures. Fire, earthquake, and intruder drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year.

To ensure student safety, staff members supervise students at all times before and after school, and during recess and lunch. Any visitors to the campus are required to check in at the school's office, wear the proper identification badge at all times, and check out of the office upon leaving.

Access to the Internet at libraries and public locations is generally provided on a first-come, first-served basis. Other use restrictions may include the hours of operation, the length of time that a workstation may be used (depending on availability), the types of software programs available on a workstation, and the ability to print documents.

Professional Development provided for Teachers

Teachers may receive assistance through the District's Instructional Coaches.

Staff and committee meetings are developed to supported classroom implementation of District initiatives including PBIS, Project Based Learning, Imagine Learning, Discovery Ed and use of Chromebooks to support student learning.

The district supports staff development through three Professional Growth Days each year.

Staff have an opportunity to attend professional development opportunities through San Leandro Teachers' Association, the Alameda County Office of Education, partnership with San Francisco Opera.
