## Principal's Message

Dr. Ernest Garcia Elementary School has a dedicated staff that sets high personal and school standards for curriculum, instruction, student performance, and student behavior. We currently serve 714 kindergarten through fifth grade students, including 48 pre-school students. All 27 teachers are highly qualified under No Child Left Behind (NCLB) requirements. Our school-wide focus is developing students for 21st Century Learning and preparing them to be College and Career Ready in the future. Dr. Ernest Garcia Elementary School has been at the forefront in implementing the new Common Core Standards in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Teachers have received extensive training in the new ELA standards and the new Houghton Mifflin Go Math Program for students in Kinder through 5th grade and have implemented with fidelity. Open communication between our school and our public is highly valued. We encourage our parents/guardians to participate actively in their child's education by attending school functions, becoming a member of the School Site Council (SSC) or English Learners Advisory Council (ELAC), volunteering in the classroom, regularly communicating with their child's teacher, and making sure their child is at school every day and on time. The use of our School Loop Website, Parent Link, Parent Involvement Activities, and the establishment of a solid home school connection have kept Garcia families and staff informed and focused on roles necessary for student learning. We will continue our efforts for Garcia to be successful in implementing the Common Core State Standards. We will be diligent in our efforts to monitor expectations and outcomes and make changes/revisions as needed. We have interventions in place to give additional assistance to all students needing greater academic support. We are confident that our efforts are well-defined, implemented, and monitored and will result in academic success. Community & School ProfileNestled below the San Bernardino Mountains, the City of Rialto lies in the west portion of the San Bernardino Valley, due west of the County Seat. Rialto is sixty miles to the east of Los Angeles and 103 miles north of San Diego. Rialto Unified School District served 25,957 students in grades kindergarten through twelve during the 2013-2014 school year. Comprised of 19 elementary schools, five middle schools, three traditional high schools, one alternative high school, one continuation high school, and a community day school, the district offers instruction on both traditional and year-round schedules. Located in the northwest quadrant of Colton, Garcia Elementary School operates on traditional school calendar. The school served approximately 725 kindergarten through fifth grade students during the 2013-14 school year. Student demographics are displayed in the chart.

#### School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

Garcia Elementary School, originally constructed in 1994, is currently comprised of 26 permanent classrooms, two portable classrooms, a parent center, a teacher workroom, a staff lounge, a nurse's office, a cafeteria/multipurpose room, a library, a computer lab, a play field, and one playground. The most recent additions to the campus occurred in 2006 and included the installation of a shade structure on the field. The chart displays the results of the most recent school facilities inspection as of December 2014. Any deficiencies listed in the chart are added to the work order process when time and funding are available.

### School Safety

The safety of students and staff is a primary concern of Garcia Elementary School. All visitors to the campus must sign in at the office and wear a visitor's pass at all times. Supervision is provided to ensure the safety of each student before school, during breaks, at lunch, and after school. Supervision is a responsibility shared among parent/guardian volunteers, teachers, and administrators. To further safeguard the well-being of students and staff, a comprehensive School Site Safety Plan has been developed by the School Site Council. The Safety Plan was most recently updated in March 2012; any revisions and updates are reviewed immediately with the staff. Key elements of the Safety Plan focus on the following:

- School rules & procedures
- Disaster procedures/routine & emergency drills
- Current status of school crime
- Notification to teachers
- Child abuse reporting procedures
- School-wide dress code
- Policies related to suspension/expulsion
- Sexual harassment policy
- Safe ingress & egress of pupils, parents/guardians, & school employees

The school is always in compliance with the laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. Safety drills, including fire, earthquake, and code yellow are held monthly.

## **Cleaning Process**

The school provides a safe and clean environment for students, staff, and volunteers. The District's Board of Education has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the district. Basic cleaning operations are performed on a daily basis throughout the school year with emphasis on classrooms and restrooms. A joint effort between students and staff helps keep the campus clean and litter-free. The principal works daily with the school's custodial staff to develop sanitation schedules that ensure a clean, safe, and functional learning environment.

#### Maintenance & Repair

A scheduled maintenance program is administered by the school's custodial staff on a regular basis, with heavy maintenance functions occurring during vacation periods. Additionally, a scheduled maintenance program is administered by Rialto Unified School District to ensure that school grounds and facilities remain in excellent repair. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority; repair requests are completed efficiently and in the order in which they are received.

## Facility Improvements / Deferred Maintenance

The district has a five year, Deferred Maintenance Plan designed to address expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components and any needed Facility Improvements. Typically this includes roofing, plumbing, heating electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems.

## School Safety Plan

The safety of students and staff is a primary concern of every School site. All visitors to the campus must sign in at the office and wear a visitor's pass at all times. Supervision is provided to ensure the safety of each student before school, during breaks, at lunch, and after school. Supervision is a responsibility shared among parent/guardian volunteers, teachers, and administrators.

To further safeguard the well-being of students and staff, a comprehensive School Site Safety Plan has been developed by the School Site Council. The Safety Plan was most recently updated in March 2015; any revisions and updates are reviewed immediately with the staff. Key elements of the Safety Plan focus on the following:

- School rules & procedures
- Current status of school crime
- Notification to teachers
- Child abuse reporting procedures
- School-wide dress code
- Policies related to suspension/expulsion
- Sexual harassment policy
- Safe ingress & egress of pupils, parents/guardians, & school employees
- Disaster procedures/routine & emergency drills

The school is always in compliance with the laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. Safety drills, including fire, earthquake, and Intruder on campus are held monthly.

## **Professional Development provided for Teachers**

A constructive evaluation process promotes quality instruction and is a fundamental element in a sound educational program. Evaluations and formal observations are designed to encourage common goals and to comply with the state's evaluation criteria and district policies. Temporary and probationary teachers are evaluated twice a year and tenured teachers are evaluated every other year.

Evaluations are conducted by the principal, who has been trained and certified for competency to perform teacher evaluations. Evaluations are based on the "California Standards for the Teaching Profession," which include the following: Engaging and Supporting all Students in Learning; Understanding and Organizing Subject Matter for Student Learning; Assessing Student Learning; Creating and Maintaining Effective Environments for Student Learning; Planning Instruction and Designing Learning Experiences for all Students; and Developing as a Professional Educator.

Due to the state fiscal crisis, additional funding from the State of California that would provide an opportunity to offer district-wide professional development through "Buy Back Days" has not been available for the past four years. Rialto Unified School District (RUSD) has worked within the state fiscal crisis to provide an alternative plan of action for staff development, and has established a comprehensive District-wide Professional Development Center (PDC). The PDC provides ongoing staff development in a variety of formats throughout the school year (i.e. during the school day with substitutes provided, after school, on-site, weekends, and during instructional breaks). In collaboration with the PDC, teachers have access to online videos and resources as additional professional development support.
