Principal's Message:

Montezuma will provide a safe and positive learning environment to ensure all students can develop the college and career readiness skills necessary to become productive members of the community.

All teachers, at Montezuma provide instruction and assessment based on the California Common Core standards, CAFE (Comprehension, accuracy, Fluency and expanded vocabulary) Reading strategies, and utilize the district adopted curriculum and materials. Teachers meet biweekly to collaborate, analyze data and plan. Additional opportunities and programs to meet the individual needs of all students include: Advancement via Individual Determination (AVID), after school tutoring and homework support, and a Learning center for extra support and intervention. Additionally, we have a beautiful library with a wide variety of books to help support literacy from grades transitional kindergarten through eighth grade. We also feature a computer lab and class sets of Google Chromebooks equipped with intervention programs for reading and math. We offer two full time counselors, a speech therapist, a part time campus Security officer, and a mental health clinician to assist with a student's and family, social, behavioral and attendance issues.

Montezuma is committed to working collaboratively with its community and families in order to create an atmosphere of learners. Parent involvement activities include: the monthly newsletter, English Language Parent Involvement Committee meetings, Family Involvement Committee, School Site Council, Parent Coffee Hours, Academic Workshops, Positive Parenting Classes in English and Spanish, Parent teacher conferences, a variety of workshops held by community groups such as Farmers Market, Child Abuse Council, Concilio, St. Joseph's Medical Center, San Joaquin County Behavioral Health Services, and Migrant Education are some of the organizations that work with our parents. The administrative team participates in Instructional rounds.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

Montezuma has 40 classrooms to support our student population. The actual amount occupied, and in use varies year to year, as enrollment fluctuates. We also have: a multipurpose room, a library and an administration building. Our multipurpose room supports our breakfast and lunch program, school assemblies eight grade graduation and other events.

District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

A scheduled maintenance program is administered by the district to ensure that all classrooms, restrooms, and facilities are well-maintained and in good repair. The principal works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

More facts about the condition of our school buildings are available in an online supplement to this report called for by the Williams legislation of 2004. What you will find is an assessment of more than a dozen aspects of our buildings: their structural integrity, electrical systems, heating and ventilation systems, and more. The important purpose of this assessment is to determine if our buildings and grounds are safe and in good repair. If anything needs to be repaired, this assessment identifies it and targets a date by which we commit to make those repairs. The guidelines for this assessment were written by the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) and were brought about by the Williams legislation. You can look at the six-page Facilities Inspection Tool used for the assessment on the Web site of the OPSC.

School Safety Plan

Our school places a strong emphasis on ensuring the safety of all students and staff members. The school's custodial team ensures the school facilities are in compliance with all federal and state health and safety regulations. Each year a deep cleaning process occurs during a close of school, either during the summer or other extended breaks. In the event of a facility plant emergency, the principal notifies appropriate site and district personnel to resolve the emergency and safely secure or evacuate the students, based upon the site and district emergency preparedness plans. A site review with the district Internal Evaluation Instrument (IEI) occurs annually.

A comprehensive School Safety Plan, which was recently reviewed by the School Site Council, helps to provide a secure, peaceful and clean environment for the school community. The school's Disaster Preparedness Plan identifies procedures to follow during emergencies and natural disasters. Emergency drills are conducted on a regular basis.

Every effort is made to ensure students are monitored while on campus throughout the school day. Yard supervisors, teachers, site administrators and school staff provide supervision for students before and during school. The playground is safe for all students. All visitors must sign in at the office and receive proper authorization to be on campus. All visitors are required to display their passes at all times.
